PERFORMER PROFILES: June 2012

Our favorite Austin-based band returns with a hilarious show full of twisted humor and highly literate, sharply pointed lyrics poking fun at politics, love, religion, and mass culture. Founding members Conrad Deisler and Hank Card, both on guitars, plus Bruce Jones on bass and Darcie Deaville on fiddle, mandolin, and offer up spiffy vocal harmonies and polished instrumentals that come together for a sound that's part bluegrass, part country, part Cajun, and pure irreverence.

The Lizards' new DVD, 30 Years of Lost Luggage, attests to the group's historical significance, from the good old days of "Jesus Loves Me (But He Can't Stand You)" to hummable contemporary fare like "The Drugs I Need."



Whether you're hoping to laugh 'til you're sore, to get a little perspective on current events, or just to hear some really fine music, this show will certainly fill the bill!.

JOSÉ-LUIS OPOZCO Saturday June 2, 10:30 am

Both kids and adults can expect to laugh, dance, and sing in English and Spanish, when beloved educator, author, and musician José-Luis Orozco performs an hour-long benefit concert for Bay Area Hispano Institute for Advancement (BAHIA).

Los Angeles-based José-Luis has performed before millions of children over the years, and has gained a dedicated following of teachers across the continent who use his books and music in their classrooms. He has recorded 13 albums of lirica infantil (Latin American children's music) and written three award-winning books comprising an extraordinary bilingual collection of songs, rhymes, tongue twisters, lullabies, games, and holiday celebrations gathered from Spanish-speaking countries.



Dan Crary & Thunderation Monday June 4

Submit your ears to the "mindboggling" (Houston Chronicle) guitar playing of newgrass pioneer Dan Crary. A flatpicking stylist of great innovation and brilliance, Dan transcends the boundaries of style and genre.

During his youth in Kansas, Dan became interested in the type of steel-string, flat-top guitar favored by artists like Doc Watson. In 1968, he founded the Bluegrass Alliance with Vince Gill, Tony Rice, and Sam Bush, and used Watson's style as a jumping-off point for innovation. During stints with fiddler Byron Berline and banjoist John Hickman, Dan polished his reputation as a master interpreter of traditional music while exploring bluegrass' intersections with other genres. His proj-



ects have included collaborations with Béla Fleck and Mark O'Connor, among many others.

As featured on his recent CD, Perfect Storm, Dan's trio, Thunderation, includes Steve Spurgin and Martin Stevens. Steve is a veteran of the folk, americana, and singer-songwriter scenes with a resonant voice and unrivaled story-songs. Multi-instrumentalist Martin's tasteful picking and smooth vocals have earned him a reputation as one of the hottest young talents on the Pacific Northwest bluegrass scene today.

Danny Click & the Americana Orchestra Wednesday June 6

Guitarist and songwriter extraordinaire Danny Click takes the stage with his all-acoustic Americana Orchestra, presenting unique, string-enhanced chamber music settings of his compelling songs of struggle and redemption.

Born in Indiana, Danny spent his youth immersed in country and blues music. After the aspiring guitar hero packed up and moved to Austin, he formed Danny and the Hurricanes, released his debut album, Forty Miles, and toured with folksinger Jimmy LaFave.


Danny's most recent album, Life Is A Good Place, includes the featuring wide-open songs with a dose of hope for all the people who hear them. The album remained on the country, pop, and Americana


radio charts for more than 10 consecutive months, with the first single, "Wait my Turn," reaching #1on Nashville's Indie World Country Chart.

David Gans is a veteran songwriter, performer, and radio producer (he hosts the nationally syndicated Grateful Dead Hour and Dead to the World on KPFA). Tonight, he performs his own engaging, "warmly cynical" songs within the $\it americana$ and jam-band spectrums. David's most recent full-length CD is The Ones That Look the Weirdest Taste the Best.

International Steel Guitar Hall of Famer Bobby is a living legend, exuberantly blending country, swing, and rock with groups including Commander Cody and the Lost Planet Airmen, Asleep at the Wheel, and Barbara Mandrell. Bobby's group includes John Nichols (guitar and vocals), Eddie Kendrick (bass), and Ken Owens (drums) for a set of country swing and jazz.

Big Lou the accordion princess (Polkacide, Those Darn Accordions) continues to shake up the polka world with her unique blend of accordion, horns, and steel guitar. Steel guitarist extraordinaire David, along with bassist David Golia, Gene Reffkin on drums, Anna Lise Zamula on sax, Greg Stephens on trombone, and vocalist Kathleen Enright, join Lou for a wideranging set of tunes from Texas, France, Poland, Germany, and Hollywood.

Melody Monsters David Grisman & Frank Vignola Sunday June 10

Marvelous mandolin innovator David Grisman and guitar virtuoso Frank Vignola fill our listening room with beautiful melodies, virtuoso musicianship, and plentiful good vibes as they serve up unique versions of some of their favorite jazz classics from the "great American songbook", spotlighting selections from the recent duo CD, Frank 'n' Dawg.

Forging his own musical path in his own inimitable way, David is known far and wide for his "dawg" music, a jubilant, highly intricate, harmonically advanced hybrid of so many different stylistic influences (swing, bluegrass, Latin, jazz, gypsy, to name a few) that he had to invent the name for it. In addition to his own renowned groups like David Grisman Quintet, Old and In the Way, and the



David Grisman Bluegrass Experience, David has recorded with Jerry Garcia, Stephan Grapelli, and many more.

One of the world's truly extraordinary guitarists, Frank's jaw-dropping technique has made him the guitarist of choice for many of the world's top musicians, including Ringo Starr, Donald Fagen, Wynton Marsalis, and the late guitar legend Les Paul, who included Frank in his "Five Most Admired Guitar List." Raised in the New York area, Frank has explored a range of musical genres over the years, leading jazz projects like Appel Direct, and playing with the likes of Donald Fagen, Queen Latifah, and Mark O'Connor.

David Nesmith Benefit Show Maria Muldaur.

Laurie Lewis & the Right Hands, Midnite Ramblers Monday June 11

This benefit for peace activist, environmentalist, and river runner David "Chicken" Nesmith brings a great lineup to our stage, with Maria Muldaur,

Maria, who began her music career by applying her magnificent honey-vinegar voice to the Even Dozen and Kweskin Jug Bands, is an innovative interpreter of just about every stripe of American roots music, from blues, early jazz, and gospel to folk, country, and R&B. Her passion for an eclectic range of musical genres is reflected in over 35 solo recordings, which include children's albums and her 2001 Grammy Award-nominated *Richland Woman Blues*.

Native Berkeleyite Laurie's songwriting, fiddling, and crystal-clear singing have brought her national recognition, a Grammy, and two International Bluegrass Music Association Awards for Female Vocalist of the Year. Featuring bluegrass and folk classics plus gorgeous originals Laurie is backed by mandolinist and singer, Tom Rozum, fiddler Chad Manning, banjo ace Patrick Sauber, and bassist Andrew Conklin.

Presenting traditional Cajun and Creole music, the Midnite Ramblers set toes tapping with their lively two steps, soulful blues, and haunting waltzes. Agi Ban (Aux Cajunals) on fiddle and vocals, Julay Brooks (Creole Belles and Honky Tonk Dreamers) on guitar and vocals, and Mark Marcin on accordion and fiddle have been making irresistible music together since 2008.

David, who suffered a massive stroke in January, spent the past four decades devoting his energy to peace and the environment in organizations like International Voluntary Services, the Bay Chapter of the Sierra Club, the Environmental Water Caucus, and Friends of the River, Healing Adventures, and Inner City Outings. Proceeds from tonight's show help defray David's health care expenses.

Linda Tillery's New Knee Fundraiser Tuck & Patti, Keith Terry, Ray Obiedo & Friends, Wayne Wallace Quintet, Faye Carol, Rebeca Mauleón, Molly Holm Tuesday June 12

In an inspiring show for a great cause, an impressive lineup of musical talent join forces to keep Bay Area cultural asset Linda Tillery mobile!

Since their groudbreaking Windham Hill Jazz album Tears of Joy in 1988, the unique vocal/guitar jazz duo of Tuck Andress and Patti Cathcart has cast its passionate musical spell worldwide, capturing the hearts of lovers, the respect of jazz buffs, and the jaw-dropping awe of guitarists. The duo beautifully blends Patti's velvet gospel vocals and writing and arranging prowess with Tuck's guitar virtuosity in a wide-ranging repertoire of great American songbook favorites and originals.





Virtuosic body percussionist Keith Terry brings together music and dance in projects like Slammin, Crosspulse, and collaborations with artists from Bobby McFerrin to the Turtle Island String Quartet. Windham Hill artist Ray Obiedo is a jazz guitarist who has appeared on albums with Herbie Hancock, Sheila E, and led the jazz fusion group Kick and the rock band Rhythmus 21.

The evening's roster of incredible jazz talents continues with trombonist/keyboardist/vocalist/composer Wayne Wallace & his band, bluesy Bay Area diva Faye Carol, Afro-Cuban and Latin Jazz pianist Rebeca Mauleó, and inventive singer/composer Molly Holm with her blend of jazz, improvisation, and North Indian Raga.

Linda, the centerpiece in many of the Bay Area's most popular bands over the past four decades, was in Bobby McFerrin's vocal ensemble Voicestra, and currently leads the Cultural Heritage Choir.

Rodney Crowell & Mary Karr w/ Steuart Smith

Wednesday June 13

Join Grammy Award-winning singer, song-writer, and record producer Rodney Crowell and New York Times best-selling author Mary Karr for a CD release concert in support of their first collaboration, the album KIN (Vanguard),



a collection of ballads and country rockers. Guitarist Steuart Smith of the Eagles joins Rodney and Mary for tonight's show.

Rachel Efron, Alexis Harte's The Lemon Hammer

Pianist and songwriter Rachel parlays a background in poetry, social anthropology (her major at Harvard), and a lifetime of instrumental study into songs that push the envelope of pop in search of deeper meaning. San Francisco Chronicle music editor David Weigand described her this way: "The voice is airy, plaintive, the sound, at first, seemingly detached, but it isn't long—about three notes will do it—before Rachel Efron hooks you by the heart." Dan Feiszli on acoustic bass and Dawn Richardson on drums, plus other surprise guests join Rachel tonight in spotlighting selections from her recent album Put Out The Stars.

Alexis Harte is a singer-songwriter and guitarist. With The Lemon Hammer, he shares his gift of song craftsmanship in a sweet and sour mash-up of rock, folk, blues, soul, and pop, ripe with sticky rhythms, searing leads, and soulstirring delivery. Fergus Lenehan provides the hammer with his 4 and 5 string basses. Damond Moodie provides vocals, lyrics, and rhythm guitar, and Aaron Brinkerhoff holds it all down on the stand-up cocktail drum kit and harmonica.

Crazy Wisdom Saves The World Again! SCOOP NISKET Friday June 15

Radio personality, best-selling author, and Buddhist meditation teacher, Wes "Scoop" Nisker brings his well-rounded comic monologue to the Freight for a one-night stand. In this show, entitled *Crazy Wisdom Saves The World Again!* Scoop covers literally everything, from the Big Bang to the decline and fall of the American empire, all the while examining the foolish human condition and the joys and sorrows of living in the modern age.

A veteran broadcaster media, famous for his news collages and satirical slant, and for his tag line, "If you don't like the news, go out and make some of your own," Scoop is an affiliate teacher of Buddhist meditation and philosophy at Marin County's Spirit Rock Meditation Center. With Crazy Wisdom he offers us the rare insights that can arouse wonder, gratitude, and deep laughter. As poet Lawrence Ferlinghetti says,



"Scoop's show is not just crazy, it is wisdom, exactly the kind we need today. It points to satiric truths about science, the American empire, and the humanoid condition. Also, the show is very, very funny."

The Folk Collection, a harmonious quartet based in Southern California, performs a choice selection of the songs made famous by the Kingston Trio, the Limeliters, Peter Paul & Mary, John Denver, and other great artists of the mid-20th century folk music revival. From "Blowin' in the Wind" and "This Land is Your Land" to "Where Have All the Flowers Gone" and "Four Strong Winds," the group aims to please with a nostalgic, entertaining singalong. They recently added a medley of TV western theme songs from the '50s—familiar to young audiences who have seen these shows on cable TV.



Tony Unger, Ed Labowitz, and Mike Sirota, along with bass guitarist Bob Packham, grew up in the 1960s and fell in love with the story songs and three-part harmonies of that acoustic era. Ed and Tony have performed together since their days at Hollywood High School, have noted: "The turnouts at our shows confirm that there are many baby boomers, as well as younger folks, who really like listening to words and harmonies—and joining in when the mood and song fit. We get a real kick out of watching teenagers, who reluctantly come to our show as a favor to a parent or grandparent, and leave smiling and humming tunes we sang."

Duck is devoted to a wide range of musical styles, from traditional Irish and Appalachian fiddle tunes to ragtime, blues, gospel, swing, and modern jazz. Duck has collaborated with numerous acclaimed musicians, from fingerpicking icons like Leo Kottke and jazz master Jamie Findlay to free music luminary Eugene Chadbourne and Irish fiddler Kieran Fahy.





Joe pairs stellar technique with a clever sense of humor in songs like "Racing Off to Yoga Class" and "Are You from Berkeley?", co-written with Duck. He is a past winner of both the California State Flatpicking Championship and the National Fingerpicking Championship. Currently on the teaching staff at the Freight, he has collaborated with David Grisman, Peppino D'Agostino, and Tom Constanten of the Grateful Dead.

Steve Seskin, Liz Longley, Julia Sinclair Friday June 22

Top songwriter Steve Seskin joins forces with two fresh new songwriting talents, Liz Longley and Julia Sinclair, for an "in-theround" evening of hearth-tugging music.



An inspiring performer and one of today's most successful songwriters, Steve has been a Freight favorite since the 1970s. While Steve's songs—an eclectic blend of humor and pathos, love songs and looney tunes—have been covered by scores of famed artists (John Michael Montgomery, Waylon Jennings, and Tim McGraw, to name but a



few), there is nothing like seeing Steve cast his spell in live performance. In addition to his career as a top songwriter, Steve has also seen his song "Don't Laugh at Me" (co-written with Allen Shamblin) inspire the development of a character and anti-bullying education curriculum in thousands of elementary schools across the country.

After graduating from Boston's Berklee College of Music, Liz soon relocated to Nashville and began assembling an impressive resume. An exuberant, multi-talented fiddle and piano virtuoso as well as the possessor of a lovely singing voice and a stage presence like a ray of sunshine, Barbara's rich background includes classical piano and violin studies, immersion in the musical culture of Ghana, ground-breaking work with the jazzfolk-bluegrass band Montreux, composer Terry Riley, and singer Teresa Trull.

With masterful guitar licks, a soulful voice, and a charismatic stage presence, Shelley performs her rock, R&B, jazz, and funk-inspired tunes with raw energy, a jubilant imagination, and freshness. In addition to her own band The X-tet, she is a member of Sistas in the Pit, a founder of Jambay, and has played & recorded with Bonfire Madigan, Kindness (rocktronica), and many others.

Joined by Egyptian keyboardist Osam Ezzeldin, Brazilian drummer Celso Alberti and very special guest Indian vocalist Mahesh Kale, their combined talents express a distinctly twenty-first century perspective on global music, grounded in jazz, focused on groove and informed by rhythmic and melodic traditions of the five continents of their homelands...Africa, Europe, North America, South America and Asia.



Paul McCandless & Antonio Calogero Thursday June 28

Grammy-winning jazz woodwind player Paul McCandless and captivating guitarist Antonio Calogero join forces for an evening of innovative world music.

A soaring, deeply moving lyricism marks Paul's performances and compositions. His distinguished career includes stints with seminal world music bands the Paul Winter Consort and Oregon, and collaborations with Béla Fleck, tabla artist Sandip Burman, and The String Cheese Incident. Reflecting his grounding in both classical and jazz disciplines, Paul plays a wide range of reed instruments including oboe, English horn, soprano saxophone, clarinet, and pennywhistle. His numerous honors include shared Grammy Awards for Best New Age Album for CDs with Paul Winter Consort and Best Pop Instrumental Album for his 1996 CD with Béla Fleck.

Italy-born, classically trained Antonio is a bright light in the new generation of acoustic guitarist/composers. Drawing on folk, jazz, classical, and international influences, the poetic sensibility of the Mediterranean is always

present when this intense and captivating guitarist takes the stage. After relocating to the Bay Area in the mid-1990s, Antonio joined Brian Gore's International Guitar Night tours, and formed the Antonio Calogero Ensemble with bassist Michael Manring and percussionist Brian Rice.



Bay Area trio Golden Bough bring a fresh feel and expert hand to haunting ballads, beautiful airs, and lively songs from the Celtic regions. With a repertoire rooted in the traditional music of Ireland, Scotland, Wales, the Isle of Man, French Brittany, and Spanish Galicia, these modern-day minstrels expand upon these styles with intriguing arrangements and originals.

Paul Espinoza, Margie Butler, and Kathy Sierra blend their voices in pristine three-part harmony, backing themselves on an array of acoustic instruments (Celtic harp, guitar, octave mandolin, mando-

lin, accordion, violin, pennywhistle, and bodhran). Their recent double CD, Down by the Greenwood, celebrates Golden Bough's three-decade history of music making with a selection of early songs from the trio's early recordings.



Legends of Waikiki Marlene Sai, Gary Aiko, Nina Kealiiwahamana

Saturday June 30

Three iconic figures from Hawaiian traditional music-Marlene Sai, Gary Aiko, and Nina Kealiiwahamana-bring beautiful tunes and heaps of aloha to the Freight stage, joined by special guests Kenneth Makuakane and Jeff Au Hoy, and Patrick Landeza hosts.

Hawaiian Music Hall of Famer Marlene started out singing with Don Ho at Honev's in Kaneohe. Oahu in 1960. She has built a solid career as an internationally touring singer with over 20 albums to her name, and an accomplished actress on stage and television.

The first male vocalist to ever win a Na Hoku Hanohano Award (Hawaiian Grammy), back when it was called the Nani, Gary melts emotions with his deep, silky baritone singing. He began his began his career in 1957 as a singer performing four shows a night at the





Waikiki Sands Restaurant. He soon joined the band at Honey's, playing upright bass behind Don Ho, Sonny Chillingworth, and an occasional Gabby Pahinui. He went on to become an internationally touring singer, with engagements from Brazil to Hong Kong and New York's Carnegie Hall. Currently a solo singer with the Honolulu City and County Royal Hawaiian Band since 2004, Gary also performs weekly at the Waikiki Beach Marriott Resort.

Katherine "Nina" Kealiiwahamana Rodrigues Rapozo began singing as a child with her famous mother, Victoria II Rodrigues ("Auntie Vickie"). In 1957 she joined the cast of Hawaii Calls as a member of The Waikiki Girls trio, and she remained with the radio show through its last broadcast in 1974. She also began her nightclub career at Waikiki Biltmore's Top of the Isle showroom where she sang for Queen Elizabeth II and Emperor Hirohito on their visits to Hawaii. The recipient of three Nani Awards and a Na Hoku Hanohano Award for Lifetime Achievement, the City & County of Honolulu honored Nina in 2005 as one of 100 influential citizens who have made enduring contributions to it's Honolulu's history and culture.

Kenneth, the recipient of twelve $Na\ Hoku$ Hanohano Awards, performs regularly with multi-award winning group, The Pandanus Club. Jeff is a master of the classic Hawaiian steel guitar. Berkeley-based Hawaiian music impresario Patrick, a top slack key guitarist, studied with late slack key masters Ray Kane and Sonny Chillingworth.
